New Makeover for the Old Barn

The old red barn got a makeover this fall. Broken boards were repaired on the outside

and a new coat of paint was applied. The windows at the top of the barn were also reconfigured to help keep the birds out.


The barn was originally built in 1901 as a dairy barn. It had a hay loft on the upper level and a milking parlor below. The old rope

and pulley system for moving piles of loose hay can still be seen at the top of the hay loft. The barn structure is made of white oak beams with mortise and tenon joinery. There are no nails, bolts, or metal plates holding them together, just wood pegs.

The barn was in rough shape when Jasmine Meadows bought it in 2013. SCTB pulled out

Sentence to Serve crews broke up the concrete and moved it away.

Today SCTB is again using the barn for hay storage. The lower level is a horse shelter where Rocky the horse has been staying for the last several months. With the new upgrades, the barn should last for many years to come.



Pasture Rehaul Completed

Over the last few months, you may have noticed quite a few changes happening in the SCTB landscaping department!

This spring, we made the decision to "rehaul" our pastures and get them healthy enough

to sustain our horses for the entirety of the warm season. To do this, we needed to not only seed with a high quality equine grass seed, but also clear all the fence lines so that the electric fences worked properly, cut down many, many trees, remove

mountains of buckthorn, put up new fencing and gates, and much more! A healthy set of

pastures not only allows us to spend less money on hay every year, but it's also a very good nutrition source for our horses.

As you know, Mother Nature can put up quite the fight, so before beginning our pasture rehaul, myself and one of our

volunteers, Jeannie Heckel, attended a pasture management seminar at the University of

Minnesota. The U is one of the top resources in the country when it comes to equine health and nutrition, so we knew we were in the right place to learn!

Jeannie and I had lots of help to get this

project complete; the Sentence to Serve Crew was a huge help in some of the bigger projects (cutting trees, buckthorn removal, etc.). Anthony Grayden, Karen Malmskog, Joe Heckel, Karen Harjes, and Austin Harjes all were huge helpers in getting this giant undertaking done as well!

Today, our pastures have been successfully "revamped" to each include two high quality

grass paddocks, a dry lot (where we feed hay), and an intricate gate system that allows us to cycle where the horses are eating so that we can let the grass rest. We plan to continue working on adding more shelter to each pasture this fall and next spring.
